Projects are being implemented, reaching out to communities and media while establishing a balanced governance adaptable for a challenging water future

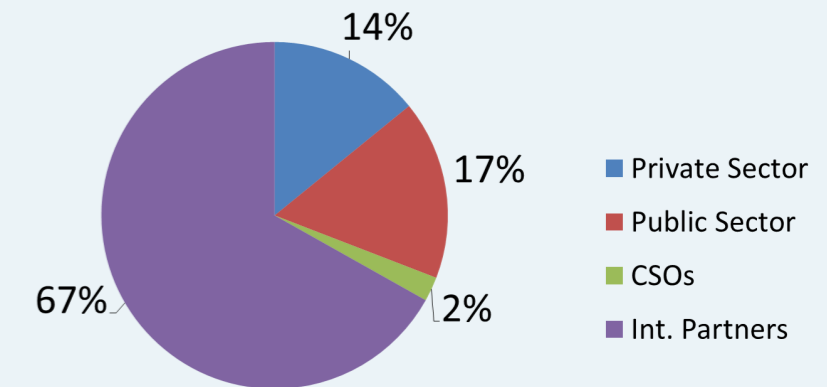
LuWSI's multi-stakeholder governance was strengthened

- 3 project teams established

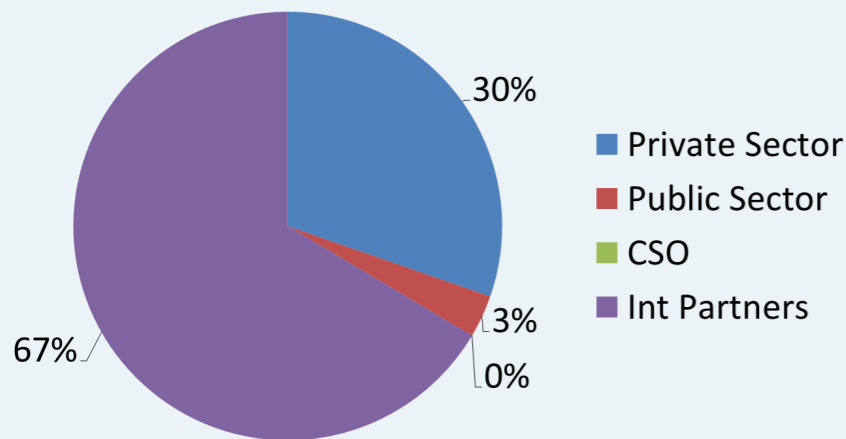
21 partners - 1 vision:

Wellfield Protection Project (WFPP)

LuWSI acted as an incubator for the set up of the WFPP

Shaft 5 Wellfield and Mass Media Wellfield will supply about 110,000 LWSC customers with water.

Project partners make significant efforts to stop encroachment on the wellfields.

PLAZA developed plans to use the **wellfields as recreational parks** led by and open to communities.

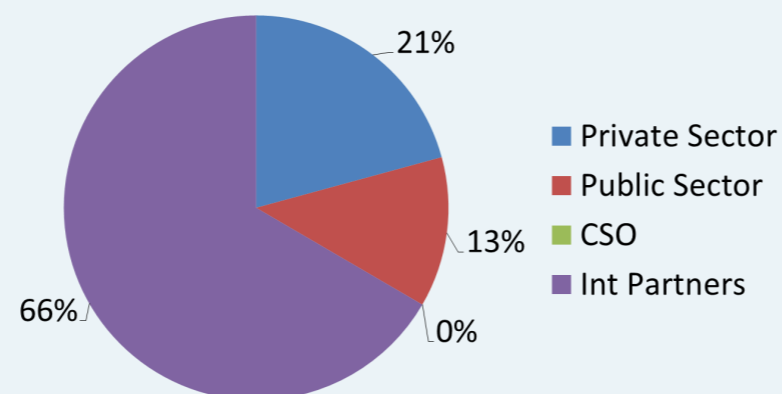
Implementation of the Alliance for Water Stewardship (AWS) Standard

LuWSI supports the implementation of the AWS standard for the first time in Lusaka by Fairy Bottling, by having established a comprehensive multi-stakeholder reference group. This acts as a technical advisor and sparring partner.

Awareness and Education Campaign (A&EC): over 400 pupils trained

In 10 peri-urban areas, over 400 pupils received training on water security. They disseminated crucial messages on water security to their classmates and communities reaching over 50,000 indirect beneficiaries.

Future Resilience for African Cities and Lands (FRACTAL)

LuWSI works together with FRACTAL to improve the understanding of current and future risks for Lusaka. Stakeholder dialogues and learning labs helped to translate crucial scientific data for decision makers.
